





He is an award-winning performer and writer at both the local and national level. wāni is a 2018 Greenroom award winner, as well as the 2019 Australian slam poetry champion.

Wayne Macauley's short fiction has been published in numerous magazines and journals and his collection, *Other Stories*, was shortlisted for a Queensland Premiers Literary Award. He has also published six novels, variously shortlisted and/ or longlisted for: the Victorian Premier's Literary Award (three times), the Western Australian Premier's Book Award, the Melbourne Prize Best Writing Award, the Adelaide Festival Awards for Literature, the Voss Literary Award and the Miles Franklin Award.


